Message from Mayor Tony Perry



During the summer months, the Township Committee and I devoted ourselves to safeguarding open space and bolstering both recreational opportunities and economic growth by acquiring several properties. Most notably, we moved to preserve undeveloped properties near Garden State Parkway Exit 114 and the Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center. It is unconscionable that a developer felt that this secluded 19 acres of wooded area could support 500 new apartments where there are currently no utilities, unpaved roads, and environmentally sensitive areas.

These four lots on Red Hill Road, West Nut Swamp Road, Nut Swamp Road, and Dwight Road are appraised for \$1.26 million. This action by the Township Committee is possible due to the open space referendum that was overwhelmingly passed by voters in 2020. The Township Committee and I are working to preserve as many undeveloped properties as financially possible.

We will continue to put our tax dollars to good use by preventing high-density housing, protecting open space, and promoting smart growth in redevelopment areas where infrastructure such as utilities, parking areas, public transportation, and offices already exist. This fight will continue into the future and we must continue to defend Middletown and our quality of life against builders and curb massive overdevelopment.

We hope to have your support as we continue to protect Middletown's quality of life.

You can mail the form to Christopher Siciliano, Monmouth County Superintendent of Elections, 300 Halls Mills Road, Freehold, NJ 07728 or drop it off at the Clerk's Office (Town Hall, 1 Kings Highway) between the hours of 8:30am-4:30pm.

Early voting begins Saturday, 10/28 through Sunday, 11/5. Vote locally at Croydon Hall Gymnasium (900 Leonardville Road, Leonardo) from 10:00am-8:00pm on Monday through Friday and from 10:00am-6:00pm on Sunday. ACCELERATED TAX SALE: DECEMBER 20, 2023

In New Jersey, all municipalities are required to hold at least one tax sale per year. The 2023 Accelerated Tax Sale for the Township of Middletown will be an **ELECTRONIC TAX SALE** held on Wednesday, December 20th for **DELINQUENT TAXES**.

Delinquent sewer charges will be sold in the future. If your sewer account is delinquent, you are strongly urged to contact the Township of Middletown Sewerage Authority (TOMSA) at 732-495-1010 to bring your account current. These delinquent charges will be sold in the future unless you are in an agreed payment plan with TOMSA or a utility assistance program with the state. These delinquent sewer charges can place a lien against your property.

All properties sold at Tax Sale are for delinquent municipal charges for the 2023 tax year and prior years. State law regarding the New Jersey Tax Sale process can be found in New Jersey statute: N.J.S.A 54:5-19 etc. The New Jersey statutes can be found at the Middletown Township Public Library (55 New Monmouth Road) or online at www.njleg.state.nj.us/.

Please note that the Tax Sale process will begin on Monday, November 13th at 4:00 PM. Per this process, delinquencies will be subject to a 2% cost of sale (minimum \$15 but no more than \$100). In addition, delinquencies will be subject to a mailing fee of \$25 for each mailing. Two mailings are scheduled for this process. **THESE FEES ARE REQUIRED AS PART OF THE TAX SALE PROCESS AND CANNOT BE WAIVED.**

All payments received after 4:00 PM on November 13th for property taxes must be made using guaranteed funds: attorney trust check, title company check, cashier's check, cash and/or money order to remove the property from the tax sale process. Any other form of payment will not be accepted. All other checks — online, personal, and business — will be returned. In addition, the credit/debit card/e-check options will not be available after 4:00 PM, November 13, 2023 for anyone in the tax sale process.

If you have any questions, please feel free to reach out to the Tax Department at 732-615-2086. If you have any questions about delinquent sewer charges, please reach out to TOMSA at 732-495-1010 since guaranteed funds are required as well.

Route 36 Corridor Redevelopment Project Update

Middletown Township held a public information session in March about the Route 36 Corridor Redevelopment Project. Mayor Tony Perry opened the meeting by addressing the packed room at VFW Post 2179 in Port Monmouth. Attendees included residents, business owners, and members of the Township Committee, Planning Board, and Zoning Board of Adjustment.

Township Administrator Tony Mercantante gave an overarching view of what the project entails and Stan Slachetka, who was representing T&M Associates, discussed the goals of the redevelopment investigation study.

In July, there were three public Planning Board hearings to discuss the results of the study, which included evaluating the 500 properties along the 321 acres and 5 miles of Route 36's residential and business zoned districts to promote economic incentives and revitalization. At the hearings, property and business owners within the redevelopment investigation study area were able to hear the results of the study, learn what properties qualified as an area in need of redevelopment, and ask questions and provide feedback about what they envision the Route 36 corridor to look like during the public comment period. A representative from New Jersey Natural Gas was also there to exhibit The SaveGreen Project's energy efficiency programs which provide business owners with a budget-friendly pathway to saving energy and money while reducing their carbon footprint.

KNOW YOUR PROPERTY'S FLOOD RISK

Throughout Middletown there are areas with a high risk for floods from both bay and riverine flooding. To see your flood zone and base flood elevation, please visit [msc.fema.gov/portal/home](https://www.fema.gov/portal/home) and search your address. Residents should reference the preliminary mapping for local building code purposes.

If you are a homeowner in Middletown and interested in purchasing or renewing flood insurance policies, you may be eligible for a discount on your policy since the Township participates in FEMA's Community Rating System (CRS). FEMA's CRS provides discounts for flood insurance premiums within and outside the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA), commonly known as the 100-year floodplain. Please contact a licensed insurance agent for more information.

Stormwater Pollution Prevention Program: A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Nonpoint source pollution is a contamination of our groundwater, waterways, bays, and oceans that results from everyday activities such as fertilizing the lawn, walking pets, changing motor oil, washing cars, and littering. With each rainfall, pollutants generated by these activities are washed into storm drains that flow into our waterways and oceans. They can also soak into the ground and contaminate the groundwater below. The collective impact of nonpoint source pollution threatens aquatic and marine life, recreational water activities, the fishing industry, tourism, and our precious drinking water resources.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we are asking for your help to do something about it. By sharing a portion of the responsibility and making small changes in our daily lives, we can keep these common pollutants out of stormwater. All our efforts add up to cleaner water and save us from the high costs of cleanup once it becomes polluted.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful, and to comply with federal requirements, the Township of Middletown has adopted ordinances to prohibit various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution, including ordinances regarding Pet Waste, Wildlife Feeding, Litter Control, Improper Disposal of Waste, Containerized Waste/Yard Waste Collection, Private Storm Drain Inlet Retrofitting, and Illicit Connection.

If you want to finance the purchase of a home that needs rehabilitation or finance improvements to your current home, the Federal Housing Administration's (FHA) Section 203(k) Rehabilitation Mortgage Insurance Program (203(k) Program) may be the right choice for you. This program is available through FHA-approved lenders and allows homebuyers to finance the purchase of a home or homeowners to refinance a current mortgage, combining the cost of renovations, repairs, or remodeling into a single loan.

The program permits homebuyers and homeowners to have home repair improvements incorporated into their mortgage. This way you can quickly and easily tap into cash to pay for property repairs or improvements, such as those identified by a home inspector or an FHA appraiser. Those who are buying a home can make it move-in ready by remodeling the kitchen, painting the interior, or purchasing new carpet. Homeowners can make property repairs, improvements, or prepare their home for sale. The 203(k) Program is also often used to rebuild or repair after a natural disaster such as a flood or hurricane. PORT MONMOUTH FLOOD CONTROL PROJECT UPDATE

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Port Monmouth Flood Control Project continues with active construction of Contract 5 along Main Street and Park Avenue. A levee-floodwall system and pump station is currently being built along Compton Creek, and work will soon begin to elevate a portion of Port Monmouth Road between Main and Church streets. Contract 4, which includes construction of a floodwall along Highway 36 and Creek Road, as well as road closure gates at Campbell Avenue and Broadway, is the final contract of the project and will be awarded to a contractor in 2024 once easements have been completed. Completed phases already mitigating the area consist of a floodwall along Port Monmouth Road, a pump station and floodgate in Pews Creek, and a road closure gate at Old Port Monmouth Road. The entire Port Monmouth Flood Control Project is expected to be completed in 2026.

FIGHTING THE FLU: PREVENTION TIPS

There are a few things that can be done to prevent coming down with the flu and spreading it:

- 1. Get vaccinated each year.** Recent studies conducted by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) show that flu vaccination reduces the risk of flu illness by between 40% and 60% among the overall population during peak seasons.
- 2. Practice routine handwashing.** According to the CDC, properly washing your hands is like a "do-it-yourself vaccine" that can help stop the spread of germs that lead to respiratory illnesses like the flu. The organization recommends a five-step process (see graphic below).
- 3. Use hand sanitizers.** When a full handwashing isn't possible, hand sanitizers are an effective alternative, but they don't work as well when the hands are visibly dirty or grimy. Look for a sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol, as this level quickly reduces the number of germs present on the hands. However, sanitizers do not eliminate all germs or remove all harmful substances, so regular handwashing is still recommended.

CDC Provides Helpful Handwashing Tips



Wet your hands with clean, running water (warm or cold), turn off the tap, and apply soap.



Lather your hands by rubbing them together with the soap. Be sure to lather the backs of your hands, between your fingers, and under your nails.



Scrub your hands for at least 20 seconds. Need a timer? Hum the "Happy Birthday" song from beginning to end twice.



Rinse hands well under clean, running water.



Dry hands using a clean towel or air dry them.

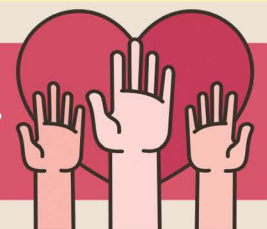

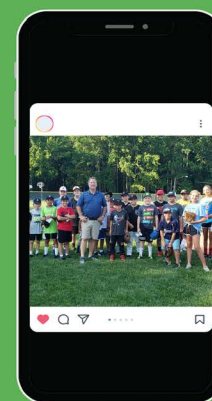

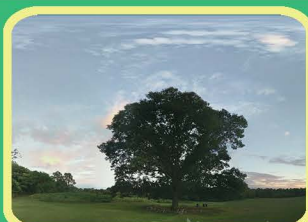

Residents can bring leaves to the Middletown Recycling Center (52 Kaness Lane) from November 1st until June 1st. Brush is accepted year-round for residents.

CONOVER BEACON TO ILLUMINATE OUR SHORES ONCE AGAIN

After years of searching for a contractor to ably refurbish the historic Conover Beacon in Leonardo, DPW decided to tackle the job in-house. Fleet Maintenance Division Head John Malizia and master welder Justin VanArsdale developed a plan to replace rusted out sections of the small lighthouse with new steel plates and bolts. Once the beacon was structurally restored and inspected by the Township Engineer, New Jersey based company GPC, Inc. painted the tower to match its original colors with a high-grade, weatherproof marine epoxy that should protect the beacon for many years. John contacted Pharos Marine Automatic Power, Inc. in Louisiana to find a new decorative light to symbolically illuminate the local landmark. The solar light is expected to be installed by spring.

DPW crews from the Parks, Roads, and Recycling divisions will work together to clean the surrounding area so beachgoers can observe the beacon up close.
