

MIDDLETOWN COMMEMORATES 20TH ANNIVERSARY OF 9/11 WITH PATRIOTIC CEREMONY AND THOUGHTFUL ADDITIONS TO MEMORIAL GARDENS

Middletown Township held a memorial service at the Middletown World Trade Center Memorial Gardens on Saturday, September 11th in honor of the 20th anniversary of the World Trade Center attacks.

To mark the 20th anniversary, the Middletown WTC Memorial Gardens Committee made several enhancements to the Gardens. With the help of Middletown-based Whirl Construction, they installed a new walkway of personalized bricks purchased by community members that lead to the memorial pathway. The Committee also added two monuments: The Heroes Monument, a symbol of gratitude to Middletown's first responders and members of the military, and The Capriotti Memorial to honor Detective Lt. Joseph Capriotti, and all those lost to 9/11-related illnesses. Detective Lt. Capriotti was known as the "keeper of the list" since he had the difficult task of notifying every single Middletown family who had lost a loved one that day. He ultimately gave his life for 9/11, dying from a 9/11-related illness in June 2019. Middletown PBA Local 124 also hosted a successful first annual 9/11 Memorial 5K Race. All proceeds were donated to a scholarship fund in his honor.

Moving forward, the Committee is raising funds for a fountain that will embrace visitors at the end of the memorial walkway. With both remnants from the original World Trade Center, and an inspirational poem embedded in the concrete path around it, "The Rise of Hope" fountain will serve as a reminder of our past as we look toward the future. Tax Collector's Message: Accelerated Tax Sale December 28, 2021

In New Jersey, all municipalities are required to hold at least one Tax Sale per year. The 2021 Accelerated Tax Sale for the Township of Middletown will be an ELECTRONIC TAX SALE held on December 28, 2021 for DELINQUENT TAXES ONLY.

Although delinquent sewer charges cannot be sold this year, if your sewer account is delinquent, you are strongly urged to contact the Sewer Authority at 732-495-1010 to bring your account current. These delinquent charges will be sold next year and can place a lien against your property.


All properties sold at the Tax Sale are for delinquent municipal charges for the tax year 2021. State law regarding the New Jersey Tax Sale process can be found in New Jersey statute: N.J.S.A. 54:5-19 etc. The New Jersey statutes can be found at the library or online at: www.njleg.state.nj.us.

Please note the Tax Sale process will begin automatically on November 11, 2021 and per this process, delinquencies will be subject to a 2% cost of sale (minimum \$15 but no more than \$100). In addition, delinquencies will be subject to a mailing fee of \$25 for each mailing. Two mailings are scheduled for this process. THESE FEES ARE REQUIRED AS PART OF THE TAX SALE PROCESS AND CANNOT BE WAIVED.

ALL payments received after November 10, 2021, for property taxes MUST be made using guaranteed funds: attorney trust check, title company check, cashier's check, cash and/or money order to remove the property from the Tax Sale process. Any other form of payment WILL NOT be accepted. All other checks — online, personal, and business — WILL be returned. In addition, the credit card/ACH payment options WILL NOT be available after 3:00 PM, November 10, 2021 until January 5, 2022.

Saker ShopRites, Inc. received Middletown's first Green Business Award at a Township Committee meeting in September. The new ShopRite of Kings Commons in Middletown (1361 NJ-35) has implemented many environmentally-friendly practices by utilizing the latest energy-efficient technology, including LED lighting in the store and parking lot, and an HVAC system that uses demand ventilation, which adjusts to the changing environment maximizing efficiency. The store also features in-floor radiant heating, which uses reclaimed waste heat from the store's refrigeration system, a parking lot that uses bioswales to capture, treat, and infiltrate stormwater runoff, as well as doors installed on refrigerated cases to reduce energy consumption up to 75%. Saker ShopRites, Inc. also has a robust multi-stream recycling program and processes expired products through an onsite bio-digester to minimize waste. Any excess prepared foods or expiring food that can be frozen are donated to local food banks.


MIDDLETOWN AND MONMOUTH COUNTY HOST SMALL BUSINESS ROUNDTABLE

Parks & Facilities Upgrades Report

Bodman Park (Market St.) A brand new playground with new elements was installed; funded by Capital Funds and Open Space Trust Fund

Butterfly Pollinator Garden (Oak Hill Rd.) A garden was created to encourage pollination and boost ecosystem health; funded by the Association of New Jersey Environmental Commissions Grant and a donation from the Poricy Park Conservancy

Corporal William A. Schulz Park (Fairview Dr.) The playground was refurbished; funded by Capital Funds and Open Space Trust Fund

Countryside Park (Cherry Tree Farm Rd.) A brand new VistaRope freestanding net play system was installed; funded by Capital Funds and Open Space Trust Fund

Normandy Parks Improvement Project (Nut Swamp Rd.) Four youth-size, multi-sport fields were installed; grass field at Nut Swamp School was converted to synthetic turf and used to create a multi-sport full-size field and three youth-sized fields; parking lot and soccer ball plaza were expanded; lighting and basketball backboards were upgraded; adjustable poles were added; funded by Monmouth County Municipal Open Space Grant

Roosevelt Park (Port Monmouth Rd.) An ADA compliant, stainless steel, outdoor water fountain was installed, featuring a bottle filler, pet fountain, and hose bib; funded by Community Development Block Grant

Tindall Park (Tindall Rd.) A dog park will be created, and the tennis and basketball courts will be resurfaced

Middletown Resident Kathleen Malouf Recognized for Winning National Award



Kathleen Malouf was recognized at a Township Committee Meeting in May for being one of only two nurses in North America to win the Johnson & Johnson Nurses Innovate Quickfire Challenge for her COVID-19 inspired IsoPouch invention.

By creating a portable pouch that sticks to isolation gowns and does not interfere with PPE, Kathleen has made it easier for frontline workers to provide more sanitary and efficient care in high-stress environments. As a recipient of this award, Kathleen can receive up to \$100,000 in grants to manufacture her invention and make her prototype become a reality.

Middletown Hosts Butterfly Garden Planting Event at Poricy Park!

In June, the Middletown Green Team hosted a volunteer planting event to finish the butterfly garden at the Poricy Park Nature Center (345 Oak Hill Road). This new garden does not only benefit its visitors, such as bees, butterflies and birds, but also our overall environment, as these pollinators are a vital part of our ecosystem and the health of our local plant life.

This garden was funded through a \$1,500 grant that was received from the Association of New Jersey Environmental Commissions in 2020. Three local organizations were involved in the completion of the garden: Poricy Park Conservancy, who contributed funding to the project, Oasis tlc, who maintains the gardens, and the Green Team who brought much-needed volunteer labor!

MIDDLETOWN HIGH SCHOOL SOUTH GRADUATE SELECTED AS STATE SEMI-FINALIST IN GOVERNMENT ESSAY CONTEST

KNOW YOUR PROPERTY'S FLOOD RISK

Throughout Middletown, there are areas with a higher risk for floods than others. To find out whether you live in a flood-prone area, visit www.floodsmart.gov and click on Flood Maps and Zones (My Flood Zone) to access the Flood Map Service Center. You can search the flood map using your property's address.

If you are a homeowner in Middletown and interested in purchasing or renewing flood insurance policies, you may be eligible for a discount on your policy because Middletown participates in FEMA's Community Rating System (CRS). FEMA's CRS provides discounts for flood insurance premiums within and outside the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA), commonly known as the 100-year floodplain.

Stormwater Pollution Prevention Program: A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Nonpoint source pollution is a contamination of our groundwater, waterways, bays and oceans that results from everyday activities such as fertilizing the lawn, walking pets, changing motor oil, washing cars and littering. With each rainfall, pollutants generated by these activities are washed into storm drains that flow into our waterways and oceans. They can also soak into the ground and contaminate the groundwater below. The collective impact of nonpoint source pollution threatens aquatic and marine life, recreational water activities, the fishing industry, tourism, and our precious drinking water resources.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we are asking for your help to do something about it. By sharing a portion of the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep these common pollutants out of stormwater. All our efforts add up to cleaner water and save us from the high costs of cleanup once it becomes polluted.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful, and to comply with federal requirements, the Township of Middletown has adopted ordinances to prohibit various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution, including ordinances regarding Pet Waste, Wildlife Feeding, Litter Control, Improper Disposal of Waste, Containerized Waste/Yard Waste Collection, Private Storm Drain Inlet Retrofitting, and Illicit Connection.

Here are some ways you can help reduce nonpoint source pollution:

Place litter in trash receptacles. Place litter, including cigarette butts and fast food containers, in trash receptacles. Recycle, Recycle, Recycle!

Avoid overuse of fertilizers. Do a soil test to see if you need to add fertilizer. Avoid the overuse of fertilizers and do not apply them before a heavy rainfall. If you use fertilizers, follow the label directions carefully.

Use alternatives to pesticides. Many household products made to exterminate pests are toxic to humans, animals, aquatic organisms, and plants. Follow the label directions carefully and use alternatives whenever possible.

Clean up after your pet. Animal wastes contain bacteria and viruses that can contaminate shellfish and cause the closing of bathing beaches. This is why the Township does not allow animals on our public beaches. Pet owners or their keepers must pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property. Dispose of wastes in the garbage or toilet.

Don't feed wildlife. Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.

Dispose of yard waste properly. Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains. Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost. Refer to our website (www.middletownnj.org) for the Township's rules, guidelines, and schedule for leaf and brush collection. You can also find the schedule on Page 12.

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products. Many common household products contain toxic ingredients. Use natural and less toxic alternatives whenever possible. Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local water bodies.

Recycle used motor oil. Used motor oil contains toxic chemicals that are harmful to humans and animals, especially fish. Recycle all used motor oil by taking it to a local, public, or private recycling center.

Wash your car only when necessary. Consider using a commercial car wash that recycles its wash water. If you wash your car at home, use a non-phosphate detergent.

Inspect your septic systems annually. An improperly working septic system can contaminate groundwater and create public health problems. Inspect your tank annually and pump it out every three to five years, depending on its use.

Keep pollution out of storm drains. The Township has labeled and marked all storm drain inlets. Labels remind residents that these storm drains are connected to local waterways. Do not let sewerage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system.

Don't dump boat sewerage overboard. Dumping boat sewerage overboard introduces bacteria and viruses to our water. It may also be illegal. Boat owners should always use marine sanitation devices and pump-out facilities at marinas.

It is important to remember these easy things you can do to assist with restoring the health of our streams and environment. Please refer to Middletown Township Ordinance Chapter 423 & Chapter 540 for our adopted stormwater pollution ordinances. 

PORT MONMOUTH FLOOD CONTROL PROJECT UPDATE



The dune, utility upgrades, levee, floodwall, pump station, road closure gate, regrading of Route 36, and tide gate have been constructed and turned over to the NJDEP for their operation and maintenance of the project.

The final contracts of the project on the Compton Creek side could start as soon as January 2022.

Property surveys, appraisals, permits, and easement acquisitions are underway to allow the construction of a floodwall & levee system along Highway 36, Creek Road, and Main Street. This will include the construction of a levee, floodwall, mitigation, Port Monmouth Road being raised, road closure gates on Broadway and Campbell Avenues, and a pumping station on Main Street, across from Renfrew Place. Work is expected to resume by 2022 and is scheduled to be completed by 2024.

CONTINUE PROPER HYGIENE AND SANITATION TO FIGHT DISEASES

While battling COVID-19 since last March, we saw cases of seasonal influenza decrease dramatically due to the extra precautions and proper hygiene we have been practicing to combat the virus.



Hand sanitizer has played a significant role in our lives since the start of the pandemic. Jugs and jugs have been plentiful, and almost every facility offers it to customers, visitors, and employees. Most people keep a bottle handy in their car and on their desk at work.

Additionally, crews were deployed to continually clean and sanitize high-touch surfaces in offices and facilities, including counters, desks, phones, and door handles. Wipes were also provided for people to use to disinfect their office area, shopping carts, etc.

Prior to the pandemic, most people did not clean their hands or sanitize surfaces to such a drastic extent. Many of us gravitated toward hand sanitizers to prevent COVID-19, not thinking about how it could also protect us against seasonal influenza.

Let's maintain these healthy habits and continue to properly wash our hands, use hand sanitizer, and disinfect all high-touch surfaces. Together, we can help fight COVID-19 as well as reduce or eliminate cases of Influenza and other diseases, such as Norovirus.



COMMUNITY ACTION NEEDED TO SLOW SPREAD OF SPOTTED LANTERNFLIES

The Health Department advises the community to be aware of the Spotted Lanternfly, a serious invasive pest that feeds on sap from over 70 different plant species. It excretes honeydew while feeding, which results in mold covering the plant and anything nearby. While Spotted Lanternflies do not directly hurt humans or animals, they can negatively impact our agriculture, economy, and everyday life.



To help slow the spread, the NJ Department of Agriculture is urging anyone who comes across the insect to destroy it immediately and report the sighting. If you see a Spotted Lanternfly, take a photo of it and report it by calling 833-4BADBUG (833-422-3284).



Middletown Recognizes International Overdose Awareness Day






