Message from Mayor Tony Perry



Two years ago, the Township Committee promised that Middletown would emerge from the pandemic stronger. We didn't close our parks for a single day, we didn't sacrifice much-needed investments in our infrastructure, and most importantly, we *did* deliver on the promises we made. I am proud that Middletown led by example and continued to move forward while others fell years behind.

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- Our Veterans Housing project on Leonardville Road in Belford is entering the final stages of design and site preparation. We expect construction to begin later this year.
- The restoration of the historic Leonardo Beacon has begun. We look forward to unveiling this important Bayshore treasure this summer.
- We will be using Green Acres funding to renovate 16 tennis courts, 2 basketball courts, as well as install a dog park at Tindall Park.
- We will also be making some capital improvements to the playground at McMahon Park in North Middletown. The funds will be used to give the playground a complete overhaul, so it offers something different for all members of our community. It will be the Township's second fully inclusive playground - the other is at Croydon Hall in Leonardo—and will include rubber surfacing, as opposed to the more common wood chip surface, creating even greater accessibility. Additionally, Middletown received \$200,000 from the County's Open Space Fund that will be used to create six pickleball courts at McMahon Park.
- A skatepark design is also in-the-works for Kunkel Park in Leonardo, and there are plans for a new ADA-friendly playground at Lincroft Acres.

Meanwhile, Township employees have started to move into our state-of-the-art municipal complex. The old Town Hall will be demolished, and the contractor will begin grading and paving a large parking lot to accompany the new building. You can visit www.middletownni.org/municipalcomplex to view a time-lapse video of the progress of the building's exterior from start to finish.

We intend to host a grand opening this summer to celebrate this new and exciting chapter in our Township's history. I am honored to serve as your Mayor and I look forward to all that we will accomplish this year together!

Passport application fees are set by the U.S. Department of State and can be found at www.middletownnj.org/njpassports.

Middletown's Passport Acceptance Agency can take your passport photo on site for \$10.00.

On January 2nd, Middletown made history by hosting its annual reorganization meeting for the first time inside the courtroom of the new municipal building. Local dignitaries, residents, and friends and family attended the meeting both in person and virtually. Tony Perry and Kimberly Kratz were sworn in to

Under the Township's form of government, the Township Committee designates two members to serve as mayor and deputy mayor for a one-year term. The Township Committee selected Tony Perry to serve as mayor for the fourth consecutive year and Rick Hibell to serve as deputy mayor for the second consecutive year. Monmouth County Sheriff Shaun Golden swore in Perry for his mayoral role, and Monmouth County Surrogate Maureen Raisch administered Deputy Mayor Rick Hibell's oath of office.

Our 2022 fire chiefs and EMS chiefs were sworn in by Mayor Perry. All volunteers of our emergency service organizations, boards, and commissions also accepted their oaths of office at the meeting.

TAX COLLECTOR'S MESSAGE

Happy Spring! The Tax Department has completed its transition to a new online payment portal. Visit www.middletownnj.org/taxpayment to print your current tax bill, pay your quarterly tax payment, view your assessed value, as well as see your payment history over the last two years. A third-party fee will still be charged for any payments submitted through the online portal.

2018 Homestead Benefit Credits MAY be applied to the May 2022 tax quarter. If you receive an adjusted tax bill, please pay the new amount shown. Taxes are due May 1, 2022, with a ten (10) day grace period. Any payment received by mail MUST be in the office no later than 4:00 PM Monday, May 10, 2022, to avoid interest charges.

Property Tax Reimbursement (Senior Freeze) applications have been mailed by the state. The deadline for filing the application is October 31, 2022. For information, please visit the state's website at www.njtaxation.org and select "Senior Freeze" or call the Senior Freeze Hotline at 1-800-882-6597.

The 2022 Final/2023 Preliminary tax bills will be mailed in July. The August quarter due date is August 1, 2022. Please review your tax bill for the last day to pay without interest. If you need to reach the Tax Department, please call 732-615-2086.

The new law, which will go into effect on May 4th, will ban the following:

- o Single-use plastic bags, regardless of thickness, at grocery stores and retail establishments
- o Single-use plastic bags, regardless of thickness, at grocery stores and retail establishments, as well as paper bags at grocery stores equal to or larger than 2,500 square feet
- o Polystyrene foam take-out food containers and other products such as plates, cups, food trays, and utensils

The goal of the law is to reduce the amount of plastic/polystyrene pollution in New Jersey which will have long-term positive impacts on both the environment and our communities.

KNOW YOUR PROPERTY'S FLOOD RISK

Throughout Middletown, there are areas with a higher risk for floods than others. To find out whether you live in a flood-prone area, visit www.floodsmart.gov and click on Flood Maps and Zones (My Flood Zone) to access the Flood Map Service Center. You can search the flood map using your property's address.

If you are a homeowner in Middletown and interested in purchasing or renewing flood insurance policies, you may be eligible for a discount on your policy because Middletown participates in FEMA's Community Rating System (CRS). FEMA's CRS provides discounts for flood insurance premiums within and outside the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA), commonly known as the 100-year floodplain.

Stormwater Pollution Prevention Program: A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Nonpoint source pollution is a contamination of our groundwater, waterways, bays, and oceans that results from everyday activities such as fertilizing the lawn, walking pets, changing motor oil, washing cars, and littering. With each rainfall, pollutants generated by these activities are washed into storm drains that flow into our waterways and oceans. They can also soak into the ground and contaminate the groundwater below. The collective impact of nonpoint source pollution threatens aquatic and marine life, recreational water activities, the fishing industry, tourism, and our precious drinking water resources.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we are asking for your help to do something about it. By sharing a portion of the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep these common pollutants out of stormwater. All our efforts add up to cleaner water and save us from the high costs of cleanup once it becomes polluted.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful, and to comply with federal requirements, the Township of Middletown has adopted ordinances to prohibit various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution, including ordinances regarding Pet Waste, Wildlife Feeding, Litter Control, Improper Disposal of Waste, Containerized Waste/Yard Waste Collection, Private Storm Drain Inlet Retrofitting, and Illicit Connection.

Here are some ways you can help reduce nonpoint source pollution:

Place litter in trash receptacles. Place litter, including cigarette butts and fast food containers, in trash receptacles. Recycle, Recycle, Recycle!

Avoid overuse of fertilizers. Do a soil test to see if you need to add fertilizer. Avoid the overuse of fertilizers and do not apply them before a heavy rainfall. If you use fertilizers, follow the label directions carefully.

Use alternatives to pesticides. Many household products made to exterminate pests are toxic to humans, animals, aquatic organisms, and plants. Follow the label directions carefully and use alternatives whenever possible.

Clean up after your pet. Animal wastes contain bacteria and viruses that can contaminate shellfish and cause the closing of bathing beaches. Pet owners or their keepers must pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property. Dispose of wastes in the garbage or toilet.

Don't feed wildlife. Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.

Dispose of yard waste properly. Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains. Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost. Refer to the Township's website (www.middletownnj.org) for the rules, guidelines, and schedule for leaf and brush collection. You can also find the schedule on Page 12.

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products. Many common household products contain toxic ingredients. Use natural and less toxic alternatives whenever possible. Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local water bodies.

Recycle used motor oil. Used motor oil contains toxic chemicals that are harmful to humans and animals, especially fish. Recycle all used motor oil by taking it to a local, public, or private recycling center.

Wash your car only when necessary. Consider using a commercial car wash that recycles its wash water. If you wash your car at home, use a non-phosphate detergent.

Inspect your septic systems annually. An improperly working septic system can contaminate groundwater and create public health problems. Inspect your tank annually and pump it out every three to five years, depending on its use.

Keep pollution out of storm drains. The Township has labeled and marked all storm drain inlets. Labels remind residents that these storm drains are connected to local waterways. Do not let sewerage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system.

Don't dump boat sewerage overboard. Dumping boat sewerage overboard introduces bacteria and viruses to our water. It may also be illegal. Boat owners should always use marine sanitation devices and pump-out facilities at marinas.

It is important to remember these easy things you can do to assist with restoring the health of our streams and environment. Refer to Chapter 423 & Chapter 540 for Middletown's adopted stormwater pollution ordinances. More stormwater-related topics can be found at www.cleanwaternj.org and www.middletownnj.org.

PORT MONMOUTH FLOOD CONTROL PROJECT UPDATE



The dune, utility upgrades, levee, floodwall, pump station, road closure gate, regrading of Route 36, and tide gate have been constructed and turned over to the NJDEP for their operation and maintenance of the project.

The final contracts of the project on the Compton Creek side could start as soon as June 2022. Property surveys, appraisals, permits, and easement acquisitions are underway to allow the construction of a floodwall & levee system along Route 36, Creek Road, and Main Street. This will include the construction of a levee, floodwall, mitigation, Port Monmouth Road being raised, road closure gates on Broadway and Campbell Avenues, and a pumping station on Main Street, across from Renfrew Place. Construction is scheduled to be completed by 2024.

HOW TO FIGHT THE BITE THIS MOSQUITO SEASON

Now that spring has sprung, we can count on a few things -- warmer days, spring showers, May flowers, baseball games -- and mosquitoes! Since many diseases can be spread by these insects, remember to take time this season to focus on controlling the mosquito larvae before they become biting adults.

Instead of relying on pesticides, you can help break the mosquito breeding cycle by getting rid of anything on your property that can hold water. Even tiny items that don't allow water to drain have the potential to allow mosquitoes to lay eggs and their larvae to grow.

Remove or turn over any containers such as buckets, unused kiddie pools and bird baths, wheelbarrows, old toys, or planters that don't drain. Clogged gutters and flexible downspouts should be addressed to allow water to completely drain. All pool covers need to be drained, and if pools are not being used and properly filtered/sanitized, they should be drained or covered.

After only seven days, adult mosquitoes emerge from the larvae that grow in stagnant water. By eliminating standing water now, less effort will need to be placed in ridding your yard of them when they become flying adults.

If mosquitoes still end up buzzing around your property after all standing water has been addressed, you can contact the Middletown Health Department at 732-615-2096, Code Enforcement at 732-615-2104, or the Monmouth County Mosquito Control Division at 732-542-3630 for possible mosquito control solutions.





CURBSIDE BRUSH COLLECTION FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. WHAT BRUSH COLLECTION ZONE AM I IN?

Visit www.middletownnj.org/zonemap to find your brush collection zone.

2. WHERE DO I GO FOR THE BRUSH COLLECTION STATUS?

Visit www.middletownnj.org/collection to find where crews are working.

3. HOW MUCH BRUSH CAN I PUT OUT?

Maximum volume of brush is 4 cubic yards (3 ft. wide, 2 ft. high, 18 ft. long). Maximum limb length is approximately 3 ft. See picture as a reference.

4. WHEN CAN I PUT MY BRUSH OUT?

Place loose brush (not in bags) and tree parts at the curb no more than one week prior to your collection date. Do not place material on the street and/or sidewalks. This creates a serious hazard for children walking to school and other pedestrians, as well as an unsightly condition in your neighborhood.

Do not set brush out after your street has been collected.



5. THEY DIDN'T COLLECT MY BRUSH ON MY ZONE START DATE - WHAT SHOULD I DO? Hang tight! It takes approximately 10 days for crews to get through each collection zone.

6. WHAT IS NOT ACCEPTED IN CURBSIDE BRUSH COLLECTION?

- Stumps and logs greater than 8 inches in diameter will not be accepted curbside and are not accepted at the Middletown Recycling Center. Residents are responsible for removal of these items.
- Railroad ties, fence posts, and lumber are not accepted in curbside bulk collection or at the Middletown Recycling Center. These items are often coated in chemicals that make them toxic and therefore unusable as mulch. Residents are responsible for removal of these items.
- Leaves will not be collected in curbside brush collection. Curbside leaf collection occurs in the fall.

Effective May 4, 2022, NJ Law will ban single-use plastic bags at all retail stores, food service businesses and grocery stores, as well as paper bags at grocery stores that are larger than 2,500 square feet. The law also bans food service businesses from providing polystyrene foam food products.

As of November 4, 2021, plastic straws are only available upon a customer's request.
