Message from Mayor Tony Perry

As Middletown Township looks to update its Master Plan this year, it is important for community members to understand the changes being proposed and how your tax dollars will be put toward open space preservation and smart redevelopment.

What's a Master Plan?

A Master Plan is a comprehensive document adopted by the Planning Board that creates both a short- and long-term vision for the Township's future. It outlines a range of strategies and objectives for land use, historic preservation, recreation, transportation, and open space preservation and is updated periodically to ensure that it remains in line with the community's evolving needs.

Middletown's Approach to Open Space Preservation

The Township Committee and I are working diligently to protect environmentally sensitive areas, as well as preserve open space and expand and improve recreational facilities.

In November 2020, residents voted in overwhelming support to increase the open space tax from two cents to three cents per every \$100 of assessed property value. This money goes into our Open Space Trust Fund to help preserve the natural beauty of the Township for generations to come. The fund is utilized for acquisition of open space through a variety of means, one of which can be condemnations. The goal of land acquisition is largely to preserve farmland and natural areas as well as maintain and improve the quality of existing parks, trails, and recreational facilities. These funds have already been used to purchase and preserve Fairview Fields, which had been owned by Fairview Cemetery.

Right now, developers want to build more than 500 units near Memorial Sloan Kettering and Exit 114, which is a perfect example of why the Township would condemn a property to prevent this from happening. The West Nut Swamp Road site contains over 18 acres of undeveloped, heavily wooded land with environmentally sensitive areas such as steep slopes and wetlands. Middletown refuses to sit back and allow developers to destroy more open space.

Another example is the Mater Dei property. The high school closed in 2022 due to declining enrollment. The site contains more than 30 acres and substantial athletic facilities including baseball fields, a football field, and a track. It makes sense to put the school's already-existing recreational facilities to good use for the benefit of our community and surrounding areas rather than see it overwhelmed with new development. The former school structure is now obsolete and would be an ideal location for an indoor recreation facility as all the necessary infrastructure, including parking and utilities, is already in place. If we do not take this step to preserve this property, there is too great a risk for this land to be sold for development purposes.

Smart Development

High density housing on every vacant property will not be Middletown's future. To help mitigate that, the Township is focusing on redeveloping properties that are already developed with the goal of putting housing, including affordable housing, near existing infrastructure such as utilities, transportation, and other resources. The idea is to encourage economic growth and put development where it belongs.

The Township has some creative options to put housing in locations that are far more appropriate. Consistent with the Township's methodology for identifying sites suitable for housing, we would pinpoint areas that are already paved, near public transportation, and present an opportunity for efficient use of existing infrastructure. This mixed-use approach also helps keep large office buildings economically viable and able to pay their share of property taxes.

Balancing Act

The key for any municipality facing the reality of today's varied special interests is to balance them all, particularly the complex relationship between economic development and preservation. The Township's Master Plan and Open Space and Housing Plan amendments are essential tools in shaping the future of our community. By allocating open space funds to preserve suitable areas and being strategic about what areas to redevelop, the Township aims to create a sustainable and balanced growth pattern that benefits all residents. Your support and understanding of these plans will contribute to the ongoing success and vitality of Middletown.

KNOW YOUR PROPERTY'S FLOOD RISK

Throughout Middletown there are areas with a high risk for floods from both bay and riverine flooding. To see your flood zone and base flood elevation, please visit www.msfc.fema.gov/portal/home and search your address. Residents should reference the preliminary mapping for local building code purposes. To compare effective and preliminary mapping for a property, please use the FEMA Preliminary Flood Map Comparison Tool.

If you are a homeowner in Middletown and interested in purchasing or renewing flood insurance policies, you may be eligible for a discount on your policy since the Township participates in FEMA's Community Rating System (CRS). FEMA's CRS provides discounts for flood insurance premiums within and outside the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA), commonly known as the 100-year floodplain. Stormwater Pollution Prevention Program: A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water



Nonpoint source pollution is a contamination of our groundwater, waterways, bays, and oceans that results from everyday activities such as fertilizing the lawn, walking pets, changing motor oil, washing cars, and littering. With each rainfall, pollutants generated by these activities are washed into storm drains that flow into our waterways and oceans. They can also soak into the ground and contaminate the groundwater below. The collective impact of nonpoint source pollution threatens aquatic and marine life, recreational water activities, the fishing industry, tourism, and our precious drinking water resources.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we are asking for your help to do something about it. By sharing a portion of the responsibility and making small changes in our daily lives, we can keep these common pollutants out of stormwater. All our efforts add up to cleaner water and save us from the high costs of cleanup once it becomes polluted.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful, and to comply with federal requirements, the Township of Middletown has adopted ordinances to prohibit various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution, including ordinances regarding Pet Waste, Wildlife Feeding, Litter Control, Improper Disposal of Waste, Containerized Waste/Yard Waste Collection, Private Storm Drain Inlet Retrofitting, and Illicit Connection.

Here are some ways you can help reduce nonpoint source pollution:

Place litter in trash receptacles. Place litter, including cigarette butts and fast food containers, in trash receptacles. Recycle, recycle, recycle!

Avoid overuse of fertilizers. Do a soil test to see if you need to add fertilizer. Avoid the overuse of fertilizers and do not apply them before a heavy rainfall. If you use fertilizers, follow the label directions carefully.

Use alternatives to pesticides. Many household products made to exterminate pests are toxic to humans, animals, aquatic organisms, and plants. Follow the label directions carefully and use alternatives whenever possible.

Clean up after your pet. Animal waste contains bacteria and viruses that can contaminate shellfish and cause bathing beaches to close. Pet owners or their keepers must pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property. Dispose of wastes in the garbage or toilet.

Don't feed wildlife. Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.

Dispose of yard waste properly. Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains. Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost. Refer to www.middletownnj.org/collection for the rules, guidelines, and schedules for leaf and brush collections. You can also find the brush schedule on Page 12.

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products. Many common household products contain toxic ingredients. Use natural and less toxic alternatives whenever possible. Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local water bodies.

Recycle used motor oil. Used motor oil contains toxic chemicals that are harmful to humans and animals, especially fish. Recycle all used motor oil by taking it to a local, public, or private recycling center.

Wash your car only when necessary. Consider using a commercial car wash that recycles its wash water. If you wash your car at home, use a non-phosphate detergent.

Inspect your septic systems annually. An improperly working septic system can contaminate groundwater and create public health problems. Inspect your tank annually and pump it out every three to five years, depending on its use.

Keep pollution out of storm drains. The Township has labeled and marked all storm drain inlets. Labels remind residents that these storm drains are connected to local waterways. Do not let sewerage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system.

Don't dump boat sewerage overboard. Dumping boat sewerage overboard introduces bacteria and viruses to our water. It may also be illegal. Boat owners should always use marine sanitation devices and pump-out facilities at marinas.

It is important to remember these easy things you can do to assist with restoring the health of our streams and environment. PORT MONMOUTH FLOOD CONTROL PROJECT UPDATE



The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Port Monmouth Flood Control Project continues with active construction of Contract 5 along Main Street and Park Avenue. A levee-floodwall system and pump station is currently being built along Compton's Creek, and work will soon begin to elevate a portion of Port Monmouth Road between Main and Church Streets.

Contract 4, which includes construction of a floodwall along Highway 36 and Creek Road as well as road closure gates at Campbell Avenue and Broadway, is the final contract of the project and will be awarded to a contractor this summer. Completed phases already protecting the area consist of a floodwall along Port Monmouth Road, a pump station and floodgate in Pews Creek, and a road closure gate at Old Port Monmouth Road. The entire Port Monmouth Flood Control Project is expected to be completed in late 2025.

MIDDLETOWN TOWNSHIP & MONMOUTH COUNTY PARTNER TO OFFER ENHANCED HEALTHCARE SERVICES TO RESIDENTS

Mayor Tony Perry and the Middletown Township Committee recently authorized an agreement with the Monmouth County Board of Health, through the Monmouth County Health Department, for the provision of state-mandated local public health services. Through this new agreement, Middletown will enhance its services while saving nearly \$100,000 annually.

Beginning in April, the Township partnered with the County to offer free TB Skin Tests (Mantoux) on the first Monday of every month. These tests are only available to school-aged children up to 18 years old.

Appointments for the tests are required and last ten minutes. The nurse will schedule a follow-up appointment with you after the exam. Test readings will be done on the first Wednesday of every month. You can schedule an exam appointment by visiting www.middletownnj.org/tbtest.

CO-EXISTING WITH WILDLIFE IN SPRINGTIME

Along with spring comes baby season for our diverse wildlife population. Most of our local wildlife species are getting ready to nest or den to prepare for their babies. It is not uncommon to see even generally nocturnal species during daylight. For example, there are many reasons why a nocturnal animal like a raccoon would be out during the day – especially this time of year.

Please keep your distance if you notice wildlife. Do not feed or touch them. If you think there may be an issue with wildlife being sick, injured, or baby wildlife being orphaned, call Middletown Township Animal Control at 732-615-2097. After 4:00 PM and on weekends and holidays, contact the Middletown Township Police Department at 732-615-2100. Let a professional determine if the animal needs intervention.

During this time of year, you may also experience issues with nuisance wildlife such as animals living under decks/sheds, nesting in attics, or eating gardens. Animal Control does not trap and relocate wildlife and it is illegal to do so on your own. The only legal way to have healthy wildlife removed is to hire a private service that is licensed to do so.

Middletown is an area that is ecologically consistent with habitats for wildlife, so it is important to respect these habitats and find ways to co-exist.
